# National Incident Management Systems/Incident Command Structure Compliance, Curriculum, Training Requirements for Key Personnel and Training Schedule

On 1 March 2004, the Department of Homeland Security published the *National Incident Management System* (NIMS). The NIMS provides a consistent nationwide template to enable Federal, State, tribal, and local governments, the private sector, and nongovernmental organizations to work together to prepare for, prevent, respond to, recover from, and mitigate the effects of incidents, regardless of cause, size, location, or complexity, in order to reduce the loss of life, property, and harm to the environment. This consistency provides the foundation for utilization of NIMS for all incidents, ranging from daily occurrences to incidents requiring coordinated Federal response. The NIMS was updated in 2007 based on input from stakeholders at every level within the nation's response community and lessons learned during recent incidents. The National Standard Curriculum Training Development Guidance dated March 2007 was replaced by the Five-Year Training Plan, published February 2008.

On October 7, 2008, Lodi Unified School District adopted Resolution 2008-114, incorporating Homeland Security Directive #5, also known as National Incident Management Systems (NIMS) as the standard for emergency response in San Joaquin County. In July, 2009 the LUSD was awarded a Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools (REMS) grant for purposes of developing a district plan and a plan for district schools.

Federal policy requires jurisdictions and organizations to meet NIMS compliance requirements as a condition for receiving Federal preparedness assistance (through grants, contracts, and other activities). The NIMS compliance objectives for training typically require that stakeholders are providing their personnel with appropriate NIMS training.

#### **DEFINING KEY PERSONNEL**

The U.S. Departments of Homeland Security and Education recommend all *key personnel* involved in district and school emergency management and incident response take the NIMS/ICS training courses and support the implementation of NIMS. Because every school and the district are unique, and work from different operations and management structures, *key personnel* will vary from education community to community. Therefore, the district and schools emergency management teams should use their discretion to identify *key personnel* within the district and at the schools.

#### TRAINING REQUIREMENTS FOR KEY PERSONNEL

The U.S. Departments of Homeland Security and Education recommend all key personnel involved in school emergency management and incident response take the NIMS/ICS training courses and support the implementation of NIMS. Key personnel are required to complete four courses in order for an individual or organization to be considered NIMS compliant through FY 2012.

The district and schools will identify key personnel to receive training based on their roles and responsibilities in the overall emergency management program as well as the specific responsibilities related to emergency preparedness, incident management, or response. These personnel will belong to one of three groups: 1.) General Personnel, 2.) Critical Personnel, and 3.) Leadership.

- **1. General Personnel:** Personnel with <u>any</u> role in emergency preparedness, incident management, or response such as faculty and educators, school resource officers, counselors, and bus drivers.
- 2. Critical Personnel: Personnel with a <u>critical</u> role in response such as the Incident Commander, command staff, general staff, or member of another key campus emergency management team. Command staff generally refers to any staff that serves in the role of incident commander, public information officer, safety officer, or liaison officer. General staff includes any staff that serves on the operations, planning, logistics, or finance/administration branches of the Incident Command System.
- **3.** Leadership Personnel: Personnel with a <u>leadership</u> role and are typically obligated to command and manage during incident response in the absence of traditional incident response personnel (e.g., District or School Incident Commander).

Under the provisions of the district's Readiness and Emergency Management for Schools Plan, designated district administrators, principals, assistant and vice principals, and other designated staff are required to complete NIMS/ICS certification training. District staff who are not able to take district scheduled NIMS/ICS certification training with a qualified instructor may complete the certification training through an online, independent study course.

Key personnel are required to complete four courses in order for an individual or organization to be considered NIMS compliant through FY 2012. To date, the following courses are required:

- IS-100.SC Introduction to the Incident Command System, I-100, for Schools,

  Constitutes completion of course ICS-100. This course was specifically designed to provide ICS training within a K-12 school-based context
- ICS-200: ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents
- IS-700: NIMS, An Introduction
- IS-800.B: National Response Framework, An Introduction

A new course, *IS-800.B National Response Framework* has replaced the previously existing *IS-800, National Response Plan* training. If personnel have completed the previous version, they do not need to take the replacement course. However, it is recommended they complete the updated course in order to have the same information as their partners.

#### KEY PERSONNEL AND NIMS TRAINING FOR DISTRICT AND SCHOOL STAFF

Though district and school officials are not typically tasked to be highly trained, first-response, emergency management personnel, they play a vital role in the process. Emergency management teams should determine which personnel need to receive training based on their role(s) in the overall district or school emergency management program. In accordance with guidance as provided by the U.S. Department of Education, "key personnel" are required to complete the following four courses in order for an individual or organization to be considered NIMS compliant through FY 2012: 1) ICS-100 Introduction to the Incident Command System<sup>1</sup>, 2) ICS-200 ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents, 3) IS-700 NIMS, An Introduction, and 4) IS-800.B National Response Framework, An Introduction.

## ONLINE INDEPENDENT STUDY NIMS/ICS COURSES

The ICS- 100, 200, 700, and 800.B courses are all available online as Independent Study (IS) courses offered through the FEMA's Emergency Management Institute (EMI) at <a href="http://training.fema.gov">http://training.fema.gov</a>

A copy of the NIMS/ICS training certificate must be submitted to the district personnel office. For new district staff members that are required to be NIMS/ICS certified, certification must be completed with ninety (90) days from the date of hire.
