School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2017-18)

Clairmont Elementary opened in 1985 and is located on Lemans Avenue in the northeast section of the City of Stockton, California. Clairmont is a neighborhood school located in a diverse, multi-ethnic residential area. Dwellings are single family, duplex and multiple family residences.

Many Clairmont families immigrated to the United States within the last 15 to 10 years and many others are first generation Americans. A growing percentage of Clairmont's student population is immigrants from Mexico.

Special Categories Of Students Or School Staffing:

Clairmont Elementary School serves regular education and special education students, preschool through sixth grade and newborn through adult in community-based educational programs provided on site and through collaboration with the West Lane Oaks Neighborhood Community Center. Programs offered include: Better Beginnings State Preschool, Head Start Preschool, Reading Recovery and after-school literacy interventions. Through the Lodi Unified School District Adult Education Program CBET, adult learners are taught English.

Clairmont Elementary School addresses student and community needs through the regular education curriculum and in a variety of programs and grant services: School Improvement Program, Title 1, First Five School Readiness Grant and the West Lane Oaks Neighborhood Service Center.

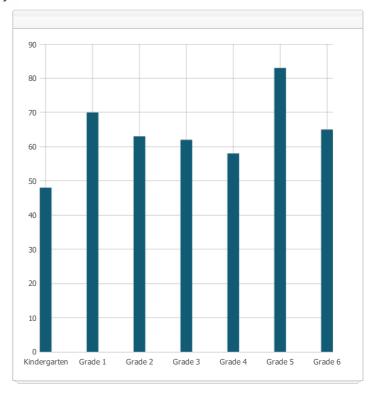

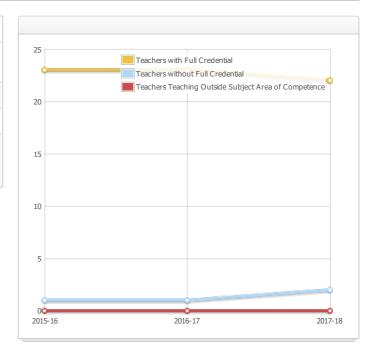

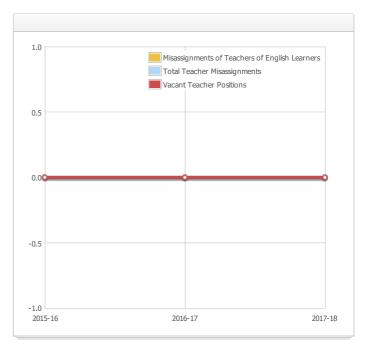

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

AGE OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS:

This school is on 9 acres and was built in 1985. It began with 11 classrooms, multi-purpose room, administrative office, and 12 portable classrooms. Ten portable classrooms were added between 1989-1999 along with one portable to be used by Healthy Start in 2000 and one portable to be used by Headstart in 2001.

MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR:

The Clairmont School facilities' condition, including grounds and restrooms, are very good based on custodial staffing, a regular district painting and maintenance schedule and funding available for equipment and supplies. Custodial workers are assigned based on a district formula to ensure equity. District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service and that emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

CLEANING PROCESS AND SCHEDULE:

A scheduled maintenance program is administered by Lodi Unified School District to ensure that all classrooms, restrooms and facilities are well-maintained and in good repair. The Principal works daily with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

Professional Development

Lodi Unified School District is committed to supporting school district staff through quality professional development. Teachers receive professional development each year. A variety of data is used to determine the focus of staff development in Lodi Unified School District. Data from state assessments, district assessments and teacher surveys assist us in identifying areas of concentration. Our current focus is on common core in mathematics and English language arts, social science, core practices, assessment, and technology. Our goal is to continue to have a highly trained professional staff that supports the success of all students in the classroom. We provide several programs and a variety of strategies to allow staff full access to training.

Teacher Induction Program (TIP) is available to newly credentialed teachers through the district. Teachers participate for two years in workshops, trainings and work closely with an assigned mentor teacher. Non-instructional personnel are offered training in technology, budget, and job specific content. Many Paraprofessionals take advantage of district offered training. Instructional coaches are available to work with staffs on-site in their classrooms as well as through district sponsored events.
